Overview

- Charles Raymond Messinger 1883-1941 (called "Ray", or simply C.R.)
- Most directly noted as President, then Chairman of the Chain Belt Company (later know as Rex Chain, and now by the more familiar Rexnord Corporation)



- Founded in 1891 by inventor C.W. Levalley, and two foundrymen, W.A. Draves and F.W. Sivyer
- \$1 million in sales in 1913, that grew to \$10 million in by 1940, under Messinger's management
- Authored one technical paper for AFS: Comparison of Electric Furnace and Steel Converter for Manufacture of Small Steel Castings (1917)

Fifteen Years—No Repairs —No Time Lost

Fifteen years ago, the Grimes Canning & Preserving Company, which operates one of the largest and most modern corn canning plants in the country, at Grimes, Ia., bought their first Rex Chain.

This chain-Rex Griplock No. 0319-was installed on a clean corn elevator.

This elevator is in continuous service thirteen hours a day during the corn canning season when up to 4,800,000 cans of corn are packed.

This is an unusual record for chain subjected to such severe usage for this length of time -but not an unusual record for Rex Chain.

As a result, the Grimes Company has installed Rex Chain on all elevators and conveyors, not only at its main plant but at its four other Iowa plants.

- Born 1883 in New Haven, Connecticut
- Studied metallurgy in high school
- Graduated Yale University in 1906 with a degree in Philosophy
- Moved to Pittsburgh to take a sales job with the Harbison Walker Refractories Company, then relocated to Chicago in 1907
- Moved to Milwaukee in 1909 to help establish the Sivyer Steel Casting Company, serving as Secretary, later ascending to Vice President and General Manager
- Married in 1911, father of four
- Became Vice President and General Manager of the Chain Belt Company in 1917



Career Highlights

- An organizer of Sivyer Steel Casting Company, Milwaukee, 1909, secretary and manager 1909-10, general manager 1910-29, vicepresident 1910-28, president 1928-29, and chairman of the board 1929-41
- Vice-president and general manager Chain Belt Company, Milwaukee, 1917-23, president 1923-31, chairman of the board 1931-41
- President Oliver Farm Equipment Company, Chicago, 1931-35 and chairman of the board 1935-41
- An organizer Electric Steel Castings Company, Chicago, 1916 and a director
- Director Interstate Drop Forge Company (secretary 1920, treasurer 1920-21, president 1921-28)
- Federal Malleable Company (secretary 1911-20 and vice-president 1920-32)

Interesting Facts

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- Ivy League Educated a rarity for AFS presidents
- Great-great-great-great grandson of Titus Smith, an officer in the revolutionary war
- Served as Chairman of the metal trades division of the War Finance Committee
- Served as a director of the Milwaukee Metal Trade & Founders Association
- Served as President of the Association of Commerce Housing Corporation
- His son William succeeded him as President, then • Chairman of Rexnord, (1963-1980) before moving on to be President of Sivyer Steel (1980-1983)

Messinger writes: "Within five days after being classed among the educated, had located in Pittsburgh and had a *job* in the sales department of the Harbison Walker Refractories Company, also had one of those beginners' salaries, and to hold this down was kept so busy that I was a fine subject for typhoid fever and consequently was laid up for repairs during October and November.

"On my return to work (December first) was sent to Blandburg, Pa. (don't look it up because you can't find it), where the company had a plant and mines. January first was called back to Pittsburgh and made a correspondent in the sales department. I now had a *position* as I had a stenographer, could sign the boss's name to letters with impunity and also have my own number shown in the lower left hand corner of the same letter.

"With about fifteen minutes' notice, on February 22, 1907, was sent to the Chicago office and was the second salesman of that office. For exactly two years lived in Chicago, although I sometimes doubted it, as my work took me from Duluth to Dallas and every other place at which trains stopped.

"In February, 1909, moved to Milwaukee and have lived here ever since, residing at the University Club up to the time of my marriage. Moved to Milwaukee to become identified with Frederick L. Sivyer, William C. Frye, and Donald Frazer in the organization of the Sivyer Steel Casting Company. Was secretary and manager of this company until January 1, 1910, when I became vice-president, which position I now hold.

"During the early part of this year, I became interested in the West Allis Malleable Iron & Chain Belt Company of this city and am secretary of same."

Messinger is a member of the University Club of Milwaukee.
